

Lastminute.com London Eye Accessibility Guide









Our team are aware that every persons experience with disability is unique, and are trained to accommodate everyone. We have radar key accessible toilets.

Tickets

One carer can enter The London Eye for free when accompanying a disabled guest. You must present one of the following forms of documentation on the day to enter with a carer ticket:

- Entitlement to Disability Living Allowance for children under 16 or Personal Independent payments for those aged 16-64, either in the form of a letter stating that the benefit has been awarded, or the actual Allowance book
- Attendance Allowance or Carer's Allowance letter of award
- Incapacity Benefit books, or a letter notifying the recipient that the benefit has been awarded
- A Blue or Orange badge, or
- In the case of visual impairment, a registration card known as the BD8 or a Certificate of Visual Impairment (CVI).
- International Proof of Disability (ISA (international symbol of access) or similar must be printed on it) Please note: The carer must be 14+ years.

You can reserve a free carer ticket during our booking journey when purchasing your standard or combination entry tickets.

Pushchairs

Pushchairs must be folded when on board The London Eye for health and safety reasons. We have a buggy park in our ticket office where they can be left. The LERC can accommodate buggies.







Mobility Access

At The London Eye we can accommodate for all mobility requirements. We can allow wheelchairs of up to 82cm width onto The London Eye and The River Cruise.

Mobility Scooters

We can allow mobility scooters of up to 82cm width onto The London Eye and The River Cruise.

Queuing If Disabled

We are happy to help guests who are unable to queue for long periods of time to access the attraction quicker if necessary. Please speak to a member of our team and they can assist you through the accessible entrance.

Hearing Impaired

We have induction loops at our tills and a BSL guide on our River Cruise.















Pregnant guests are welcome to visit The London Eye at any time during their pregnancy and are able to gain access to all levels of the attraction. If you speak to our staff, they can provide you with a breastfeeding space if you would like.

First Aid

We have a number of first aid kits available throughout the attraction and trained first aiders onsite. Should you require first aid when you visit, please speak to a member of the team. Should you require assistance whilst on the Pod, we can communicate to you via an onboard intercom.

Assistant Animals

Assistance dogs including guide dogs, seeing eye dogs and hearing dogs are permitted on The London Eye. Please note that other therapy pets and/or emotional support animals are not permitted onboard.







The Hidden Disabilities Sunflower Lanyards

The Sunflower is a globally recognised symbol for Hidden Disabilities.



The lanyard is a way that people with Hidden Disabilities can indicate to staff that they may need extra support, time and understanding.

Feel free to bring one if you have one.

See:


- Crowds outside The Eye

Who to ask for help?

Helpful tips and tricks!

Before

- The time on your ticket for The London Eye is the time you join the queue.
- We advise that you get to the River
 Cruise 15 minutes before the time on your ticket.
- It's best to go to the toilet beforehand as once you are on the pod you won't be able to go for half an hour. (Please see our map to find the toilets)
- Don't worry if you are late! We understand that travel doesn't go to plan, so you will be welcome to come at any point within our opening hours.





During

- The London Eye and The River Cruise both have ramps that can be used to board.
- The London Eye can stop its rotation if it is needed to give you time to board.
- There is an intercom on the pods of The London Eye that you can use to communicate with our ride operator.
- There is an accessible toilet on The River Cruise.
